DIALOGUES IN PUBLIC POLICY AND THE MEDIA Hosted by Bob Schieffer

A monthly series of dialogues with Bob Schieffer hosting top public-policy makers and journalists at the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS) headquarters at 1800 K Street, NW, in Washington, DC. Most programs are scheduled in the late afternoon and include question-and-answer opportunities.

CSIS is one of the world's preeminent public policy institutions. It is a bipartisan, independent, nonprofit organization that provides strategic insights and policy solutions to decisionmakers in government, international institutions, the private sector, and civil society.

The Schieffer School of Journalism at Texas Christian University is emerging as one of the world's top journalism schools dedicated to preparing professionals in both journalism and strategic communications for the new media world while maintaining the traditional standards of basic, straightforward reporting and ethics.

Bob Schieffer



Bob Schieffer is broadcast journalism's most experienced Washington reporter. He is the CBS network's chief Washington correspondent and also serves as anchor and moderator of *Face the Nation*, CBS News' Sunday public affairs broadcast. In 2008, Schieffer published his fourth book, *Bob Schieffer's America*, moderated the final debate of the 2008 campaign, received an Emmy for lifetime achievement, was recipient of the Leonard Zeidenberg First Amendment Award by the Radio

Television News Directors Association, and was named a "Living Legend" by the Library of Congress.

Schieffer has covered Washington for CBS News for more than 30 years and is one of the few broadcast or print journalists to have covered all four major beats in the nation's capital—the White House, the Pentagon, the State Department, and Capitol Hill. He has been chief Washington correspondent since 1982 and congressional correspondent since 1989. He has covered every presidential campaign and been a floor reporter at all of the Democratic and Republican National Conventions since 1972. He began anchoring *Face the Nation* in May 1991.

He has been a principal anchor for CBS News since 1973, when he was named anchor of the Sunday night edition of the *CBS Evening News*.

Schieffer joined CBS News in 1969 and, after a brief stint as a general assignment reporter, was named Pentagon correspondent, a post he held for four years.

Before joining CBS News, he was a reporter at the *Fort Worth Star-Telegram* and, in 1965, became the first reporter from a Texas newspaper to report from Vietnam. Schieffer later became news anchor at WBAP-TV Dallas/Fort Worth, a post that eventually led to his joining CBS News.

He is a graduate of TCU in Fort Worth.

Arnaud de Borchgrave



At 21, Arnaud de Borchgrave was appointed Brussels bureau chief of United Press International (UPI), and three years later, he was named *Newsweek's* bureau chief in Paris. At 27, he became senior editor of the magazine, a position he held for 25 years. He was appointed editor-in-chief of the *Washington Times* in 1985. He left his post with the *Washington Times* in 1991 to join CSIS as a senior adviser and director of the Global Organized Crime Project, which became the Transnational Threats Project after 9/11.

He has served as president and CEO of UPI (1999–2001) and continues to serve as editor-at-large for both UPI and the *Washington Times*.

Ed Henry



Ed Henry is CNN's senior White House correspondent based in the network's Washington, D.C., bureau. Named to his current position in December 2008, Henry has covered the White House for CNN since March 2006. Prior to joining the White House unit, Henry covered Capitol Hill for CNN. Henry joined CNN in April 2004 after having been senior editor and a columnist for *Roll Call*, a leading Capitol Hill newspaper, for eight years.

William Kristol



William Kristol serves as editor and publisher of the *Weekly Standard*. In January 2007 he became an op-ed columnist for the *New York Times*. Widely recognized as one of the nation's leading political analysts and commentators, he regularly appears on all the major television public affairs shows. Kristol served as chief of staff to Vice President Dan Quayle during the George H. W. Bush administration and to Secretary of Education William Bennett under President Ronald Reagan.

Clarence Page



Since 1984, Clarence Page has been a columnist and member of the editorial staff of the *Chicago Tribune*, and his column is syndicated nationally by Tribune Media Services. He also regularly appears on the *NewsHour with Jim Lehrer* as an essayist and panelist. He also is an occasional guest panelist on the MacLaughlin Group. His previous activities include 11 years as a reporter and assistant city editor for the *Chicago Tribune*; serving as community affairs director, reporter, and planning editor at WBBM-TV.

Susan Page



Susan Page is the Washington bureau chief for *USA Today*. She also appears each week on CNN's *Late Edition*, and regularly guest hosts the *Diane Rehm Show*, a daily two-hour interview/call-in show on WAMU and National Public Radio. She has won national awards for her reporting, including the Gerald R. Ford Prize for Distinguished Reporting on the Presidency, the Merriman Smith Memorial Award for Deadline Reporting on the Presidency, and the Sigma Delta Chi Award for Washington Correspondence (shared). She has worked at *USA Today* since 1995.
