

## Young Leaders 2014 Giving Challenge

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## "Singapore YLs Dine with Bonnie Glaser" by Yang Yi, Justin Goldman

Nine Young Leaders gathered on Jan. 10 for the Singapore Alumni, Associates, and Friends Chapter's first event of 2014. The group enjoyed a wonderful night of dinner and discussion at Din Tai Fung with Bonnie Glaser, a long-time friend and senior associate of Pacific Forum CSIS. She is a senior Asia adviser at the Freeman Chair in China Studies, where she works on issues related to Chinese foreign and security policy. She is concomitantly a consultant for the US government on East Asia.

Bonnie was in Singapore for the Regional Outlook Forum 2014, the flagship event of Singapore's Institute of Southeast Asian Studies held at the start of each year. She presented on a timely panel with Chinese and Japanese counterparts, addressing dynamics among the three nations, including ongoing maritime concerns. We are grateful for her taking the time to meet with the Singapore YL chapter, her schedule as packed as it was. In addition to attending the Regional Outlook Forum 2014, Bonnie met with numerous Singaporean officials.

We were pleased to see Rachel Chhoa-Howard again, who has previously attended Pacific Forum conferences as a Young Leader and took up a new position in the latter half of 2013 as associate with The Asia Group, a strategic advisory firm founded by former assistant secretary of state Kurt Campbell.



Discussions among the group ranged from ongoing challenges in China-US relations to the current dynamics within Singapore and how some of our Southeast Asian YLs viewed the competitive dynamics unfolding in Northeast Asia. As the USS Cowpens had made a port call in Singapore that week, the issue of its close encounter with a Chinese amphibious dock ship in the South China Sea in December came up. It turned out that Bonnie was on her way back to Washington to testify about this and related matters at a House Joint Subcommittee Hearing on Maritime Sovereignty in the East and South China Seas on Jan. 14.

#### "Think Again Before Exploiting the Arctic's Resources-Where's the Infrastructure?" by Aiko Shimizu

Climate change is not an ideology, as some would have us believe – it is an existential fact. Greenland's ice cap is melting up to four times faster than it was two decades ago, and if current predictions hold true, by mid-century the Arctic's seas will be navigable in the summertime. This probability may frighten climate change specialists, but it is good news to those who want to access the High North's once inaccessible resources (oil, minerals, and gas), or to rely upon its shorter and therefore cheaper shipping routes. Indeed, the burgeoning interest of governments and investors in the Arctic guarantees that for better (economic development) and worse (oil spills, shipping accidents, and cultural dislocation), the human footprint will grow exponentially in the region. For those who are ready to kick-start this 21st century 'gold rush,' however, here's an inconvenient question - where's the infrastructure that is going to support it?

# "Leveraging Mongolia" by Jonathan Berkshire Miller

If asked how China, the United States, Japan and other Asian countries might engage with each other more constructively, it is doubtful that the first word that would come to mind would be "Mongolia." And if then asked what mechanism Mongolia would use to further mutual comity and understanding, it is unlikely that 'Khaan Quest' would be mentioned. Yet there are compelling reasons to justify both answers. Military-to-military diplomacy is an important form of statecraft and its utility in Asia remains obvious.

This past summer marked the 10th anniversary of the Mongolian Armed Forces' Khaan Quest exercises, which among other activities brings militaries from around the world to share their best practices in multinational peacekeeping operations (PKO). This focus may at first appear narrow, but for three reasons the impact of Khaan Quest is potentially positive and significant.

#### USJC TOMODACHI Initiative Alumni Coordinator

The US-Japan Council's TOMODACHI Initiative office in Tokyo is preparing to hire a full-time alumni coordinator. This position is critical to allowing TOMODACHI to grow in its ability to do follow-on activities with program participants and foster even stronger leadership growth among the TOMODACHI generation.

The office is seeking a talented, dynamic, bilingual individual for the position of TOMODACHI alumni coordinator. The coordinator will be responsible for the development and oversight of TOMODACHI alumni programming throughout Japan and, in coordination with USbased staff, on programs in the United States, with the goal of building upon short-term exchange experiences to promote continued alumni engagement with the United States (or Japan, in the case of American alumni). ### APEC Policy Support Unit Researcher

The Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation's (APEC) Policy Support Unit (PSU) is looking for an analyst researcher. Reporting to the senior analysts, they will contribute to research projects by undertaking quantitative and qualitative research on a range of topics. The analyst researcher will be responsible for collecting and analyzing data and statistics for the APEC region across a range of economic and policy related indicators. They will also be responsible for producing short analytical summaries and presentations on a broad spectrum of issues of interest to APEC.

Applicants should ideally have an advanced degree in economics and at least two years experience in economic policy-oriented research. Familiarity with statistical software and prior completion of a research thesis at advanced degree level will be highly regarded. The Centre for International Governance Innovation (CIGI) is a global think tank based in Waterloo, Ontario. Created in 2001, it conducts policy research on international governance issues, including the global economy, global security, and international law. Reporting to the director of global security and politics, research fellows will contribute to the design and implementation of the program research and policy analysis, including some related administrative tasks. Successful candidates are also expected to participate and be engaged in the program's broader activities, such as, for instance, seminars and conferences. Of the two openings, one position requires specialized knowledge of Internet governance and cybersecurity issues; the other position requires specialized knowledge in the politics, economics and security of Asia Pacific with expertise in Southeast Asia. #### Global Governance Futures 2025 Fellows Program

The Tokyo Foundation, in partnership with the Global Public Policy Institute of Germany and other leading think tanks and universities in Germany, China, Japan, India, and the United States, is implementing the upcoming round of the Global Governance Futures program.

The program is seeking 25 young professionals (five from each country) to come together to look ahead 10 years and recommend ways to address three global issues that are likely to be of crucial importance in 2025: internet governance, geoengineering governance, and global arms control.

The GGF 2025 Topic Areas include:

- Working Group 1: Internet Governance
- Working Group 2: Geoengineering Governance
- Working Group 3: Future of Global Arms Control

Selected fellows will produce scenarios and develop concrete policy suggestions, participating in four dialogue sessions during the year and disseminating the results through op-eds in major publications, policy papers, journal articles, and high profile presentations. In 2010, Pacific Forum CSIS and the Tokyo-based Sasakawa Peace Foundation established the Sasakawa Peace Foundation (SPF) Fellowship Program to nurture the next generation of leaders from Japan and the United States who are committed to broadening and strengthening the two countries' alliance. For more than 60 years, the Japan-US alliance has been essential to the security of both Japan and the United States and the larger Asia-Pacific region. While the alliance has made important progress in recent years, this vital bilateral relationship continues to face serious obstacles. In the face of evolving new security challenges, it is imperative that leaders in both countries, from all fields, find concrete ways to strengthen and deepen cooperation.

#### **Resident Fellowships**

Each year, a committee of recognized Japan-US experts selects one Japanese and one US citizen from a highly competitive applicant pool to hold a residential SPF Fellowship at Pacific Forum's office in Honolulu. Resident SPF Fellows conduct a self-directed research project on an issue that relates to either existing or potential Japan-US cooperation. The article will then be published in a refereed journal or the Pacific Forum's Issues and Insights monograph series. The US Fellow will spend up to six weeks in Tokyo and the Japanese fellow will spend up to six weeks in Washington, DC, to conduct interviews and research necessary for their research project. Resident fellows are active participants in Pacific Forum's globally recognized Young Leaders Program and will have the opportunity to attend relevant conferences and dialogues throughout the region under the program's auspices. A monthly cost-of-living stipend is also provided.

#### Non-resident Fellowships

Pacific Forum CSIS and the Sasakawa Peace Foundation also offer 10-15 non-resident SPF Fellowships, tailored to those whose professional or academic commitments prevent them from committing to six months in Honolulu. Non-resident SPF Fellows are accepted for a one-year period and are able to participate in one to two Young Leaders conferences relevant to their research agenda each year. No cost-of-living stipend is provided, however costs and fees associated with Young Leaders Program participation is covered by Pacific Forum and the SPF Fellowship.

#### Eligibility criteria

For both resident and non-resident SPF Fellows, we encourage those who meet the following eligibility criteria to apply:

- PhD or master's degree with relevant work experience
- Fluency in spoken and written English
- Expertise in a security-related field
- Late 20s to 30s
- Hold either US or Japan citizenship

While we welcome candidates who have backgrounds in international relations, foreign policy, and defense and security studies, we also encourage those who come from outside these sectors to apply.
