

VIOLENCE IN THE NORTH CAUCASUS INTERIM REPORT: January 2008 – July 2009

Since January 2004, CSIS staff have been compiling, almost daily, a database that tracks incidents of violence occurring in the North Caucasus. This interim report illustrates trends in violence since January 2008.

"Violent Incidents":

Violent incidents include abductions of military personnel and civilians, bombings*, assassinations of key civilian and military leaders**, rebel attacks, police or military operations against suspected militants, destruction of property by militants, and the discovery of weapons.


"North Caucasus":

The database primarily tracks incidents occurring in Chechnya, Ingushetia, Kabardino-Balkaria, North Ossetia, and Dagestan.




Violent Incidents in the North Caucasus January 2008 – July 2009



Deaths due to Violent Incidents in the North Caucasus January 2008 – July 2009




Violent Incidents in the North Caucasus May - August 2008 and May - July 2009*
