

Data GEM: From 2015 to 2017, the number of transactions reviewed by CFIUS rose by 66 percent



The U.S. Treasury recently released its [annual report](#) on the activities of the Committee on Foreign Investment in the United States (CFIUS), an inter-agency committee that reviews foreign investment in the United States. The report showed a jump in the number of transactions notified to CFIUS in 2016 and 2017, as well as a continued increase in reviews of transactions involving a Chinese acquirer through 2017.
